The ROSA team published a report on COVID-19 vaccination trends among older adults in July which received much attention, being picked up by media sources such as The Straits Times, Channel News Asia, The New Paper and many others. The findings were also communicated directly to the Multi-Ministry Taskforce and we believe that it had a large impact on subsequent vaccination efforts by the government.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Singapore Life Panel[®] (SLP) again for your continued support for our work, without which we would not be able to make these important recommendations needed to improve the well-being of older adults in Singapore. Research Highlights

In August 2021, we asked a range of questions relating to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. It was observed that the majority of our SLP respondents were either fully or partially vaccinated (94.29%) against COVID-19, with only a small portion of our respondents who indicated that they will not get vaccinated (2.02%).




Figure 1: Proportion of respondents citing various reasons for getting vaccinated. (Note: Total is more than 100% because respondents were allowed to check all options that applied to them.)

As shown in Figure 1, the three most common reasons that convinced respondents to get vaccinated were to be able to go out with less fear of getting infected with COVID-19, to reduce the risk of getting others infected with COVID-19 and the high trust in Ministry officials who report that the vaccines are safe and effective.

We are heartened to see many of our respondents adopting a socially responsible attitude towards vaccinations. Given that booster shots for the vaccine are becoming available for adults aged 50 and above, we would like to encourage our respondents to sign up to take the shot if you can and to in turn encourage your family members and friends to do so!




Figure 2: Proportion of respondents who agreed (slightly agree, agree, or strongly agree) with the respective statements.

As Singapore introduced differentiated Safe Management Measures (SMMs) in August, we also asked our SLP respondents if they agreed with the implementation of such differentiated measures. The large majority of our respondents agreed with the implementation of SMMs (88.37%). As shown in Figure 2, the overall sentiments towards SMMs were positive as 92.35% of respondents agreed that it was necessary to protect the wider community while a smaller proportion of 77% of respondents agreed that the same privileges should not be extended to those who choose not to be vaccinated.

While fully vaccinated individuals will be able to engage in a wider range of activities, we cannot afford to be complacent and must continue to adhere to all other prevailing safe management measures. Through the cooperation and collective efforts of everyone, we hope the situation will soon stabilise and that we will learn to treat COVID as endemic.
